Congratulations go to Michelle Riley for reaching the finals in Aberdeen City's European citizen writing competition. Michelle was awarded 'runner up' at a ceremony held in the Beach Ballroom early December and was presented with an i-pod shuffle.

We are absolutely thrilled to have been successful in a community bid for the construction of a full-sized 3G football/rugby pitch complete with floodlighting. The £300,000 has come from money seized under the Proceeds of Crime Act. This is a major investment in the school and the community, increasing opportunities for sport.

I hope you enjoy reading this edition of 'Update'. My thanks to all of you for your continued support of the school throughout 2013. On behalf of the staff, I would like to wish you and your family a restful and happy Christmas.






Sports Council


Modern Languages



Scottish students from Danscentre Aberdeen dance their way to Dance Proms at the Royal Albert Hall

Talented students from **Danscentre** in **Aberdeen** were chosen to take part in Dance Proms, a major international dance spectacular at the **Royal Albert Hall** in November. Patrons of the event include top dance names such as Darcey Bussell CBE, Arlene Phillips CBE and Len Goodman (Strictly Come Dancing)

Danscentre are the only school representing Scotland in 2013 Dance Proms. They have two dance acts performing, aged between 11 and 21, entitled *My Space* and *Hide and Seek*. They joined 23 other dance acts and celebrity dancers on stage at the third annual **Dance Proms at the Royal Albert Hall** on **3rd November**. Danscentre is one of the leading dance education centres in Scotland training pupils in RAD Ballet, ISTD Modern and Tap from Pre-school – Vocational level. Many students have gone on to performing careers including Angela Towler-now rehearsal director at Rambert Dance Company, Callum Nicol currently on tour with 'Dirty Dancing' and Harris Beattie – 'Billy Elliot' who has since returned and will be performing within 'Hide and Seek'.

Dance Proms provides young dancers with a unique opportunity to perform at one of the world's most prestigious venues. Danscentre were selected from hundreds of schools worldwide to share the stage with some of the best youth dance talent around.

Danscentre performed two dances, entitled *My Space* and *Hide and Seek*. *My Space*, a Ballet piece performed by dancers aged between nine and 11, is about the battle of the sexes, with the male and female dancers fighting for the 'top spot' on stage. *Hide and Seek*, a Contemporary dance performed by students aged 17-21, explores the feelings of total despair, anger and disbelief at the loss of something precious.

Karen Berry and Michelle Whyte, commented: "We are extremely excited and overjoyed to be part of Dance Proms again. For the pupils it is an experience unlike any other and a unique opportunity to represent the North East of Scotland on an internationally recognised dance platform. To be part of something so special is a privilege and will give us memories to treasure for a lifetime".

Darcey Bussell CBE, Patron of Dance Proms and President of the Royal Academy of Dance, said: "It's so important that young talent has a chance to see what other talented people are doing at this national event. I know from my own experience how important it is to see what your peers are up to while you're training. For a student, performing at the Royal Albert Hall is out of this world. They learn so much and it will affect them for the rest of their lives."

To qualify, dance teachers submitted a short dance piece featuring original choreography in any genre, and performed as a solo, couple, trio or group performance. This year, the genres ranged from more traditional Ballet and Greek Dance, to Rock, Street Dance, Cheerleading and many more.
