


INTERNATIONAL WOMEN'S DAY

On International Women's Day, St. Margaret's School for Girls held Aberdeen's first Women in Architecture and Construction Conference. The event was a collaboration between St. Margaret's and Robert Gordon's University's School of Architecture and Built Environment. Eight academics partook in the event (two of which travelled from Edinburgh) to spend the day completing an array of activities planned by a team of academics from RGU. Myself and four other S2 pupils attended this event.



One of the many hands-on activities included using high tech lasers to scan the room and it's furniture. This is a method used by many architects who are unable to travel to a location several times. By scanning the surrounding area, architects can see each and every aspect of it without moving from their office. Another activity was to build an upgraded model of Union Square as if it were a city; it had to have facilities that everyone could access, feel homely and create a leisurely atmosphere. One group came up with the inventive idea to include a fairground in the centre of the city to show that the city was a child at heart, and to showcase its joyful atmosphere in a more literal sense.



Dr Marianthi Leon, a senior lecturer, gave a speech on the impact women have in every STEM field such as architecture or construction. She said: "Construction is an industry that requires many different skills and abilities. To achieve high levels of performance it is important to employ people from different backgrounds, with different experiences and a variety of capabilities. There is a pressing need to do more to encourage a commitment to gender diversity in the workplace and thus attract more women into the industry and enable a smoother path to senior leadership."

The construction industry has faced an immense skills shortage for a number of years, and as Dr Marianthi acknowledged during her speech, "women make up only 12% of the workforce - that is a statistic that desperately needs to change."

She finished: "Against this backdrop there has never been a better time for talented young women to enter the architecture and construction arena and this event gave pupils an opportunity to explore what a career in this field may entail." Overall, we enjoyed this event as it showed that diversity is the key to success in a work environment.

X-COUNTRY REPORT

Saturday 2nd March 2019

On a warm day in South Queensferry, Hopetoun House was the destination for the schools nationals cross country event. On the course two brutal hills, a 293ft incline and the uneven surface proved a stern task for all young athletes also playing a major part in performances.



All around, there were athletes warming, gazebos set up and hoodies being sold to cold school athletes at the top of their game. Dyce Academy runners would have had to have been up early to make the journey down, even with some car trouble all athletes made it down safely.

The Dyce runners Caiden Thom (3R), Kieran Downie (3B2) and Jordan Cruickshank (4K) competed at the national schools x-country where all the top athletes and schools compete. The first race Dyce were involved in was under 15s in which Caiden and Kieran both competed. As the gun went off Caiden got a good start with Kieran hot on his heels as they went round the first bend. Caiden, an experienced trail and hill racer, quickly extended a gap at the first hill a long vertical incline but no matter how hard Kieran worked on the down hills and the flats the hill runner kept pulling away on the 4 steep inclines from the track athletes. Caiden was the first Dyce pupil to finish with a time of 17:13 closely followed by Kieran. They both finished in respectful 66th and 78th in a tight race. Kieran showed great fitness to keep close to him but Caiden just had the hill experience over the track runner who has been trying out x-country for the first season. Both boys did very well on a challenging course in the heat in a tightly contested battle.

Next to race was Jordan in the under 17s. Jordan had been at this race last year so had some things that needed sorted out so as the gun went off, Jordan shot out the blocks all guns blazing sticking in the tight middle of the pack Jordan just couldn't get through the herds of runners that had shot off. Jordan struggled on the hills but the road runner persevered by pulling it back on the straights gritting up the hills and finished with a sprint but didn't quite reach his target. Jordan came a respectable 67th in a very strong field of runners in a respectable time of 20:13.

All the boys did Dyce Academy proud battling with the best runners in their age groups and held their own. The boys showed great sportsmanship shaking hands at the end and showing support for their fellow athletes. Their next challenge will be the East District schools competition at Balgownie on the 15th of March where they will be looking for strong positions and brilliant performances.

DYCE PE KIT & JEWELLERY POLICY

On a blustery day 11 Dyce Academy pupils, 9 running 2 out with injury battled against the elements. The athletes were set for a cold blustery day at Balgownie playing field for the East schools x-country, all eager as they boarded the bus. All except one had something to prove on their return back to the race. As the pupils arrived the 9 runners went for a reconnaissance of the course. They were all figuring out the route and their race tactics.

The first race was S1 boys that included young runner **Jamie Renfrew**. This was Jamie's first year racing at Balgownie but the athlete was part of the Aberdeen Athletics Club so Jamie knew what it was like to be competitive and be fast. So as they gathered in the start pen the nerves started to kick in. As the competitors went to the start line Jamie was at the back. The gun went off as the competitors set off Jamie slipped leaving him chasing the pack from early on not ideal for his first race for his school. As Jamie stubbornly kept chasing, slowly moving up the field. Jamie worked hard to keep his position at the last hill at then powered towards the finish. Jamie finished in a respectable place of 58th out of 71.

The next race that Dyce competed in was the S2 girls where **Ellie, Kitty** and **Emily** competed. All three girls making a return to improve on their places from last year. As the trio made their way to the start the girls started together, the gun went off Ellie was in the middle of the pack while Kitty and Emily caught at the back but keeping close. Sadly disaster struck early for Emily and Kitty. Kitty had problems early on with hay-fever she had to pull out of competing but battled through to finish the race. Emily slowed to see if her teammate was okay. Emily started her quest to gain some position Emily started to gain some time but sadly she was too far behind. Ellie kept with the pack working very hard on the hill and over took her joining another one as they went up the last hill but couldn't keep up with the final push very good effort by the girls all finishing in the good places.

The next race was highly anticipated for the three Dyce athletes **Ben Creswell, Caiden Thom** and **Kieran Downie**. The boys looking for a team prize so as the Dyce athletes lined up in the starting pen all planning their race tactics, the race was about to begin when the trio were taken up to the start line all the boys were focused on getting the best position they could. The gun went off the boys sprinting to keep a position Ben was furthest up. Ben was aiming for a top 10 finish but a strong field prevented this idea. It was just enough finishing in 13th with a tremendous time of 10:45 the other boys also had a close race as Kieran and Caiden kept close to each other but like their previous race Caiden won it by taking a lead on the hills over Kieran both worked hard to keep close to each other but Caiden held on. The last hill took everything out of Kieran but Caiden kicked on but both boys finished in 20th and 23rd but only just missed out on the team prize. Caiden finished in a time of 11:15 and Kieran in a time of 11:45 all three boys did exceptionally well in a tough competition.



Maria Kusmider was next up to face the course. Maria was in her second year of Balgownie racing in the senior girl's race and she was nervous in the starting pen with all the tall looking girls. As the girls made their way up to the start Maria started at the back but as the official fired his gun Maria took off but so did the rest of the pack. Maria settled into her stride smiling her way round, she battled her way round the course Maria finished in a respectable manner with a tough competition she held her own against the bigger stronger athletes and battled bravely while keeping a massive smile on her face the whole time.




In the final race of the day Dyce's Jordan Cruickshank was racing in the senior race as he was in the pen he was preparing himself. As the senior boys were taken up to the start Jordan was forced into a wide start so as the gun went off the athletes shot off at top speed. The Dyce athlete was in the middle but got in a wide position going into the first corner. The Dyce pupil from S4 swiftly moving up as he got his stride in. Jordan had good speed leading up the first hill driving up and back down moving further up the pack. He was accelerating till they got up the second hill and sped up round onto the second lap slowing the hill losing a position but gaining two on the downhill. He over took one more before holding on to his position with a final kick on at the end almost catching the person in front but it was too little too late. Jordan finished in a time of 17:56 for 4k. On a course that includes hills, wind and rain finishing in 13th place.

The Dyce racers battled brilliantly in the races and the support crew of Miss Halley, Katie Wilson and Cian keeping everyone in the right place for their races and looking after the bags and the warm up duo of Jordan Cruickshank and Caiden Thom getting everyone prepared to perform to their optimum level for their races and everyone as photographers. Everyone enjoyed the day as it was another successful outing for the pupils of Dyce Academy they all did their school and running club proud.



CYCLING @ DYCE


The cycling club at Dyce Academy has been going from strength to strength. We have eight main fleet bicycles and six spares, and these are being put to good use every Friday lunchtime on our weekly jaunt along the river. A core of 8-10 pupils (plus 3-4 staff) turn up every week and we are planning an extended excursion very soon, where the pupils will be away for longer and further and will enjoy a picnic!



Adventure Aberdeen provided us with a mechanic to work in the school workshop that is down in the D&T department. He worked with small groups of pupils over the course of four weeks and it was amazing to see the progress made by the pupils. By the end of the four sessions, the pupils were taking their own bikes to school for minor repairs and adjustments, so they could fix them themselves; they fixed punctures, adjusted gears, adjusted brakes, stripped drivetrains, oiled and lubricated chains and learnt how to keep their bikes in good running order for any weather! Pupil feedback has all been positive and many commented on the fantastic opportunity to get some 'hands-on' practical experience.

Adventure Aberdeen have also been running the Go Mountain Bike course from Dyce Academy. This is usually based at their Kingswells property, but Dyce Academy is so well kitted out in terms of workshop equipment and access to great trails along the river, that they were happy to run it from here. Four pupils learnt some proper mountain biking techniques in the context of enjoying the outdoors and working independently. Well done to all pupils who gained Level 2 GoMTB.

All this cycling activity has contributed to Dyce Academy being awarded Cycle Friendly Secondary School status. This is a National award that recognises the opportunities, infrastructure and ethos to encourage cycling and sustainable travel. This award lasts for three years.

Even the supervisors were trying to encourage them on while we marked other schools.



A fantastic day was had by all even if we did not come first. We ranked twelfth out of nineteen teams but we all had a fun filled day and even managed a walk through the green spaces of the university. Thank you to our lovely pupils who took part, they did Dyce Academy proud.

LANGUAGES NEWS

We've had quite an interesting time in French and Spanish this term with 1B making a film to revise descriptions and S2 learning the past tense in French in

order to say what they did at the weekend. We have had verb competitions in French and pupils in Spanish researching background information on Spain to get to know the culture, cities and cuisine of this very diverse country.



In S3, we are in the process of completing our Spanish for Life and Work course and as part of this we link with Aberdeen International Airport. On the 25th February, a group of pupils were invited to take a private tour around the Airport and its new facilities. They visited the new Departures and Security area, the Northern Lights lounge as well as the British Airways lounge and were informed of further changes to the Airport in view of its International status.

The visit culminated in a bus tour around the various runways and a visit to the Heliport. We were accompanied on our visit by Anabel Narganes who works as an Ambassador and is employed for her Language skills. Anabel visited us at Dyce Academy in January to hold conversation assessments with pupils and she was very impressed by our pupil's level and skill in spoken Spanish. The Tour was led by Fraser Bain, Terminal Duty Manager.

Every year, the Airport Terminal Operations Manager, Kevin Douglas visits Dyce Academy ML Department to talk about the Airport in general but also about career prospects within the establishment. This is done with a view to support the initiative of Developing the Young Workforce. 

The results were; Brimmond 1st, Kirkhill 2nd and Ramsay 3rd.




We have also had a Pi challenge from the Maths Department where pupils had to remember as many numbers after the decimal point as possible.

OUTLOOK EXPEDITIONS – ZAMBIA AND BOTSWANA



