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WELCOME

As we approach the start of the October holidays, I thought it would be useful to reflect on the term and share some information with you.

Staffing

I am happy to report that we are fully staffed. We are planning ahead and as such will be raising adverts for Physical Education and Physics.

S1

Our new S1 pupils have settled in well and we have already met with their parents/carers in an early Information Evening. Here we introduced the key personnel that will support the young people through their time at Dyce Academy. They have also been let loose to go to Asda during their breaks which seemed to be a particular highlight for many of them.

School Improvement Plan 2018/19

I have met with all Faculty Principal Teachers (PTs) and agreed priorities for the new session. PTs have now completed their Faculty Improvement Plans for 2018/19. A copy of the full School Improvement Plan (SIP) is on the school website.

Senior Prefects

The senior prefects have been appointed and are establishing their roles within the school. They will be using 'How Good is our School' with a range of pupils across the school and are also wanting to look at the tightening up of school uniform across the whole school. We will be asking you for your views after the October break and including current P7's

School Roll

Our school roll is increasing and for the 1st time we have had to create a waiting list for the current S2 year group.

Curriculum Model

We are currently involved in looking at our curriculum model with a move to offering 7 National Qualifications. I will be writing to parents next term to explain what this will mean and the timescale. In addition, we have been in discussion with Bucksburn Academy to discuss the Senior options. More information to follow.

Examination Results 2019

I am particularly pleased with the examination results this year. We are maintaining performance at National 5 and Higher level and there is improvement at Advanced Higher Level. We are very much measured by our attainment in Literacy and Numeracy. For those of you interested in statistics we were delighted with how our young people performed in Maths and English.

National 5 Mathematics 98% of those presented achieved Grades A-D (The highest figure in the city).

National 5 English 100% of those presented achieved Grades A-D (The highest in the city).

However, it is important to note that individual young people sit behind these figures. Every one of them will have a different set of goals and all achievements are equally valued. Every one of our young people deserve rightly deserved praise and that goes for a highly committed staff.


S3 BUSINESS ENTERPRISE CLASS



FRANCE 2019

On July 29th 2019, we flew out to Nantes, France for a two week languages camp. The purpose of this camp was to meet with 12 people aged 14-17 from each of our twin cities in France, Germany and Spain. Having previously studied French and Spanish in school we thought this would be a great opportunity to try out the languages we had learned.

We flew from Aberdeen to Amsterdam to Nantes and then had a 2 hour bus journey to Les Sables-D'Olonne. When we arrived, we unfortunately found out the Spanish people would not be coming. We were straight away mixed with the French and German people and split into groups with those who we would be sharing a tent with. Throughout the two weeks we did many activities including canoeing, surfing, cycling and sightseeing. We also went to France's 2nd largest theme park Puy Du Fou. During the 2 weeks, each country held their

own national day. For our Scottish day, we made stovies for dinner and chose scottish country dancing for our activity. Learning languages in school really helped us as, even though our French wasn't perfect, we could figure out quite a bit of what they were saying.











OUTLOOK EXPEDITIONS

We arrived at Aberdeen Airport full of excitement ready for our 24 hours of traveling to Zambia. After a long journey we got there early in the morning to the temperature being 2 degrees. Firstly we explored Livingstone before moving on to the Okavango Delta in Botswana which was a full day of travel, where we saw zebras and elephants crossing the road.



After we went to Chobe National Park where we had 2 full days of safari, we woke up at 4 am before sunrise with Miss Howard kindly making us breakfast. We saw elephants, zebras, hippopotami, loads of giraffes and nearly saw a lion hunt. During sunset we went on a river safari where there were crocodiles after crocodiles. We then traveled back to Livingstone to see the famous Victoria Falls.



After our quick visit there it was time for our last meal together in Africa, before the 24 hours of travelling where we did meet some members of the Australian rugby team.

Arriving back to sunny Scotland to reunite with our families. Thank you to Miss Stevenson and Miss Howard for everything and looking after us.



Finally it was time to move on to the Project Phase of the trip. Where we volunteered at a local school. We were helping build bricks for school staff accommodation and over the course of 5 days we managed to build 252 between the 16 of us. We got to interact with children and teachers and also had a taste of their traditional food. Last stop our cultural walk through Mwandi with a guide visiting an African Hospital.

Languages Day was on Thursday 26th September and we celebrated in our usual style with some tattoos for pupils to sport their favourite European flag.

Ms Yeoman and Mrs Smith, our Librarians kindly allowed us to do our annual Euroquiz in the Library.

Now time for the final race of the day with Dyces' Jordan Cruickshank racing in it. The 2.75 mile lap had the constant climb twice with the bigger of the two main climbs 3 times but not a quick course. The race set off quick very bunched up to start with no



room to pick up the pace at all but the downhill section came at the right time for the Dyce athlete to pull away from his group and latch on to another of the chasing packs up the climb. Working hard to pull through the groups back onto the down-hill and kept with this group for the rest of the way. The last kick for the Dyce athlete just coming in short in the sprint finish but finishing in a respectable 34th - well done to Jordan.

The boys did very well on a brutal course and did their school proud - well done boys!






