his edition of UPDATE gives congratulations and commiserations to two of our S3 pupils, Louise; and Selena who on Monday 30th April flew to London to take part in the Rowett/Flora Nutrition Competition as the only Scottish representatives.

As most other participating teams had 4-6 members, the girls did very well indeed to come 4th out of 49 entries.

The girls, both taking Standard Grade Food and Nutrition, entered the competition in February of this year when given the opportunity to do so. Most other school teams had six months to prepare their submissions, so our girls did very well by winning the Scottish section to become the Scottish representatives.

The girls were initially given a selection of topics to choose from; their choice was Production of Meat in their Home Country compared with Overseas Countries.

Aided by Mrs. Robertson of the Home Economics Department, the girls put in a great deal of hard work and research, which included visits to farms, the Mart, and Clinterty Agricultural College; they interviewed foreign students, and did a tremendous amount of reading! They compared production in this country to that in Nigeria, Kenya, Mexico, Costa Rica and Spain.

The first round, which they won, consisted of a visit to the Resources Centre in Aberdeen to give a presentation of their work and to be interviewed by the two judges. Then as winners, it was off to London on the early morning plane on 30th April. They went to the Royal College of Medicine, where again they gave a presentation and were interviewed by national judges.

Their day finished with a photosession and Award Ceremony. Prizes were presented by Duncan Goodhew.

UP TO THE BIG SCHOOL

The move from primary school to secondary school has always been a · little traumatic for some children, but schools generally try to make the transition as painless as possible. Here at Dyce we issue a comprehensive Pupil Booklet to Primary 7 pupils, the youngsters and their parents have the chance to see round the Academy at an Open Evening, Academy staff visit the primaries and the F7 pupils visit the Acdemy during the working day. There is also the two and a half day induction programme, this year to be held at Cullen Outdoor Centre. As well as all this, a group of third year pupils at the Academy came up with their own idea of how to help - they decided to make a video - and the result, 'Introducing Dyce Academy' has recently been shown to P7 pupils at Dyce, Newmachar and Fintray.

The third Year General Studies class, under the technical supervision of P.T. Drama, Laurence Young, conceived, wrote and presented the thirty-minute video. The pupils wrote to the primary 7. classes and asked, 'What do you want to know?' The pupils from all three feeder primaries wrote back with dozens of queries. The video makers chose the questions which were asked most often and set about making their

video. Some questions such as 'Why is Dyce Academy a good place to attend?' and 'What are the main differences between Primary and Secondary?' were answered by recording an interview with rector Mike Taylor, while answers to others such as 'What is a register class?' and 'What subjects will we do?' were presented in a documentary style.


The imaginative film makers also used dramatisation and reconstruction to good effect to answer qusetions like 'What happens if I'm late?' and 'What do I do if I get bullied?' Interviews with teaching staff, the canteen supervisor and Academy pupils all helped to make this an entertaining and informative video which was very well received by the pupils and staff at the feeder primaries. Each school was presented with a copy of the video to give their P7 pupils the opportunity to see it again and discuss it with their teachers.

At this time of year, our normally cheerful, energetic senior pupils look worried, pale - just not their usual selves. It's exam time.

Most societies have some sort of trial or test which young people have to go through before they are regarded as adults. In modern, 'civilised' society one such test is the school examination. Some children will be judged to 'pass', others to 'fail', but the examination is regarded as character-building for them all. The future prospects of some pupils depend upon gaining certain results, but many pupils will go on to lead happy and successful lives without achieving high grades.

Whatever we may think of the value of exams, most pupils do have the sense to do as well as they can — to make the best of the system. Most manage to keep the results in perspective, although the same cannot always be said for their parents!

It's not widely known that exams in Scotland are managed much more humanely example:

- if a candidate is unable to take an examination because of illness, an award can be made based on the school's estimate of likely performance

- if a candidate can take the exam but is unwell or suffering from some serious personal problem, then the Board is prepared to take these 'adverse circumstances' into account when deciding on a final grade

- if a candidate's final result does not match the school's expectations, then an appeal can be made to the Examination Board to reconsider their award. A number of such appeals are successful each year.

In general, the Scottish Examination Board does everything possible to ensure that candidates are treated fairly.

Exams are a strain on everyone. They are regarded by some as a rather barbaric ritual. Modern society, however, chooses not to do without them. At least in Scotland, those who administer the exams do so in a sympathetic and fair manner. Let those of us involved with 'the candidates' make sure we give them the support they need — and keep their results in perspective:




