Dyce Academy pupils - and the occasional brave member of staff - abandoned the school canteen and the local shops one Friday to experience some genuine hunger pangs for themselves.


Snippets of conversation betrayed those sufferers: "Liquids are allowed, so that must include

She is very enthusiastic about her first teaching experience. "I've really enjoyed my time at Dyce Academy," she says. "It's hard work but very rewarding to teach children as friendly and pleasant as they are here."

This fresh, more appealing approach to Technical Education is proving to be very popular with our pupils. Hopefully, it will encourage more girls to seriously consider Technology as a possible career.

SCOTTISH YOUTH THEATRE SUMMER FESTIVAL 96

Scottish Youth Theatre's annual summer festival is the biggest youth theatre event in Scotland and anyone aged 12-21 can take part. Over 130 young people from all over the country will join together for an intensive 5 weeks in the summer, experiencing every aspect of the performing arts. Next year's festival takes place in Edinburgh from 8 July until 11 August.

During the 5 weeks, Summer Festival participants work alongside theatre professionals towards 3 main productions in the final week. Along with rehearsals for the productions, participants in all courses take part in a variety of theatre skills workshops, in rehearsals for a street event and in trips, visits, special performances, talks and other activities. The work is very intense - from 9.30 am to 9.30 pm every day of the week. The Festival comprises of courses in Acting, Stage Management, Directing, Music Theatre and Video.

To take part in the Festival, previous experience in Drama is not essential, although it does help. More important is commitment, enthusiasm and loads of energy. Auditions take place all over Scotland and supervised residential accommodation is available during the Festival for participants based outside the Edinburgh area.

Fees for Summer Festival tuition on any course are just £275 for the full 5 weeks. Residences, in

student accommodation with meals, cost extra. Exact costs for 1996 are not yet confirmed but in 1995 the cost of half-board was £80 per week. Grants and bursaries are available in most parts of Scotland from local authorities, trust funds and sponsors. SYT offer help and advice to all participants on raising money for fees and residences, so no-one should be put off by the cost.

Mr Young of the school's Drama Department, has application forms. If you apply, you are guaranteed a free audition/interview depending on the course you are applying for. Auditions and interviews will be held throughout Scotland during March. Applications must be received by SYT before Thursday 15 February 1996.

Scottish Youth Theatre was established in 1977 and has held a Summer Festival each year in various Scottish cities. SYT is the largest employer of freelance theatre professionals in Scotland and in addition to the Summer Festival runs courses all year round, all over Scotland. Other events include a National Workshop Programme, a Young Playwrights' Course, SYT Productions and special projects. SYT owns the Old Athenaeum, Scotland's Youth Arts Centre, a Victorian Theatre in the heart of Glasgow which SYT is developing for young people's theatre.


