age fourteen or fifteen. As often found on the Continent, school starts at 8.00 am, with six lessons every day, each 45 minutes in length. She leaves school at 1.30 pm.

Though she has found the schools different, she feels our countries have many similarities. The populations are about the same and there are lakes, valleys and many, many castles. On the north of Slovakia there are the highest Slovak mountains - High Tatras.



Linda McGregor was in fine form recently at the North District Age Group Championships in Peterhead, where she reached the top four in all her six races.


Her best performances were in the 100m Butterly and 100m Backstroke where she


YOUNG EAGLES TAKE TO CITY SKIES
