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SQA Exams

Study leave for all **S4-S6** students will begin at **2.45 pm on Friday 19 April 2024.** Students will be issued with a personal copy of their SQA examina-



tion timetable after the Easter holidays. It is important that they check this timetable and the notices in school regarding timings and examination rooms to ensure they know exactly where and when their exams take place. Please note that timings of exams on the school timetable do differ from the timetable on the SQA website and SQA App. Students must ensure that they are reading the times of the exams from their personal timetable issued by the school.

During Study Leave school transport and the Bucksburn shuttle services will run as normal. In addition, alternative arrangements will have to be made by pupils/parents for any exams that finish beyond the normal school day as we are unable to modify school transport during the exam diet.

It is your son/daughter's responsibility to ensure that they bring the appropriate equipment to their examinations. There is a strict SQA Code of Practice forbidding mobile phones and electronic devices eg earpods, iPods, tablets, Smartwatches or any device that can be web-enabled or stores information, to be taken into the examination room.

Celebrating Success at Dyce Academy

As part of our drive to recognise the ongoing achievements and attainment of our many outstanding young people at Dyce Academy we are going to hold our first whole school Celebration of Success event in June. This evening event will be held in The Kings Hall (the old Aberdeen Exhibition & Conference Centre, King's Way, Bridge of Don, Aberdeen) on the 11th of June 7pm – 9pm. Young people from all year groups will be recognised and awarded prizes and certificates for their achievements in a number of categories and it is hoped that you as parents will attend this evening event to help support and celebrate the outstanding work of all our nominated young people.

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Update from PSE: This term in Personal & Social Education (PSE) we have been busy with subject choice with S2's and S4/5's. Pupils try to identify their strengths, skills & qualities along with what they enjoy. They do this by speaking with their Guidance Teacher and also Louise from Skills Development Scotland. When speaking to individuals we are trying to encourage them to challenge themselves and look at the appropriate levels of course that we feel they will be successful in. All year groups have had assemblies this term on school expectations and values. In PSE we discussed these and worked on 'what the values mean to them'.

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This also led into our Equality and Diversity Unit which covers Actions & Consequences, Equality Act 2010, Racism, Disability & Gender. Identity & Characteristics, Prejudice & Stereotypes and Hate Crime Awareness.

Scottish Government Vaping Addiction Campaign

In Scotland, it's illegal to sell vapes or e-cigarettes to anyone under 18, or to buy them for someone who's under 18. But this doesn't stop young people from getting hold of them. Young people are particularly vulnerable to nicotine addiction and are more likely to take health risks and discount the future consequences of this behaviour. Nicotine addiction can impact mental health, resulting in being tired, stressed and anxious and it can affect concentration and impact the ability to learn and study. E-cigarettes contain some potentially harmful chemicals, similar to those found in cigarette smoke, although at a much lower level. While the long-term effects of vaping are still being researched, it's thought they could have negative effects on the health of the heart but there is currently insufficient evidence to assess this. 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Library News

The year started with S1 pupils in Social Subjects coming to do a "Reading About Refugees" activity. Pupils looked at a range of books about refugees which included fiction, poetry, graphic novels, picture books, non-fiction and graphic



non-fiction. They had to consider such elements as front covers, blurbs and ease of reading and think about which books they preferred.



Hot on the heels of this S1s in English started their Animals unit. They researched different animals ranging in size from water voles to blue whales. Their re-

search then led on to the production of some wonderfully eye-catching and informative posters which in turn were used as a basis for a talk to the class.

Holocaust Memorial Day was on January 27th as part of this I spoke to all S2 RMPS classes about my grandmother's Swedish cousin Kerstin Cruickshank who helped rescue hundreds of Czech Jews during the Nazi period.

Once mid-term was past the S2s came to research a number of famous mathematicians including Katherine Johnson, Alan Turing and John Napier. Pupils had to find out about their lives and the times they lived in as well as their mathematical achievements. Their research was then summarised in a slide presentation which they used to illustrate a talk.

Finally, we are rounding off the term with S2s in Social Subjects where they have been learning about Mary Queen of Scots. They came to the library to undertake a carousel task where they read witness statements from a variety of historical figures and tried to work out who was responsible for the murder of Lord Darnley in 1567.

ACMS

This has been a very busy term here at ACMS. In school we have had exams, assessments and three Specialist Weekends, two of which included jazz and guitar masterclasses run by our tutors. As usual we invited young musicians from the City and Shire to join us. ACMS has also been very involved in the community. In January we entertained residents at two sheltered housing complexes in Dyce, and

performed at two Burns Suppers. Pianist Petra was honoured to have been asked to play a part in the Holocaust Memorial Commemorations at the Scottish Parliament in Edinburgh. Back on the concert trail we returned to the lunchtime concerts in the Cowdray Hall, participated in the Cathedral at Noon sessions, and joined the choral group from St.



Andrews Cathedral for evensong. This all led up to our annual March Concert in the Music Hall, we were joined by an audience of over 1000. Our programme included jazz, Scottish traditional, classical and pop before culminating in Caledonia and Highland Cathedral which everyone seemed to love. Finally, this term we joined the Aber-



deen City Music Service for two concerts at the Beach Ballroom, and will end the term with our own Pop concert in school.

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Maths Faculty Update The term from January until the Easter break is always a busy one within the Maths Faculty. Our S1s have almost completed their first year at Dyce Academy and all staff have been in agreement this year that the pupils have settled really well and had an excellent year. Our Senior classes have been very busy completing their respective courses and getting all the necessary assessments done. The final push is after the Easter break and they will only have one week before going on study leave for their SQA exams. 
<u>Pi Day Activities</u> Thursday, the 14th of March (3.14) marks a big day in the maths calendar at Dyce Academy and across the world; Pi-Day! Junior pupils were involved in Maths activities about our favourite irrational number, π . Some S1 classes completed ' π -Day' posters, while some s2 and S3 classes got extremely competitive during a ' π -Day Maths Relay.' Well done to all groups who took part and especially to those who won one of the mathematical prizes on offer. Wooden logic puzzles were provided as prizes, but Maths staff withheld the solutions! A double win for all involved!



<u>Vitruvian Man Investigation</u> One of our S2 groups has been investigating the Vitruvian Man. The pupils started off with measuring heights and arm spans to see how square they were and then they created several statistical diagrams and analysed the data further to determine how 'square' the class actually were.

Famous Mathematician Research project As part of the 'Mathematics in the Real World' section of our BGE course, our S2 groups have been finding out about famous mathematicians, past and present. Each group had two periods in the library using their resource packs to investigate and find out about the life and contributions of a famous mathematician. Pupils then had to prepare a presentation for their class. All pupils engaged really well with this task. There were some excellent talks with some really interesting information...Who knew that female mathematicians often had to pose as men in order to have their ideas accepted? Or that, after WWII, the British Government sold on captured German Enigma machines to other countries? Without letting on that they could break the codes!?








FASCINATING FACTS
